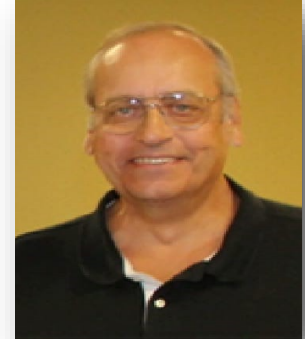

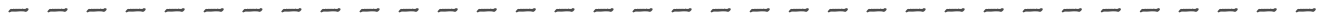

BOATING ON LAKE LANCELOT AND LAKE LANCER OPERATING REGULATIONS & RULES OF THE ROAD

Safety is the primary consideration to having a safe and enjoyable outing. The excitement, fun, and the thrills come in at a distant second. Enjoy our lakes!

Township ordinance prescribes slow/no wake speeds between the hours of 7:30 pm to 11:00 am daily.

A person shall not operate a Personal Watercraft (PWC) during the period that begins one (1) hour before sunset and ends at 8:00 am.

No skiing, tubing or towing without an observer.

Do not operate your boat or PWC within 100 feet of stationary objects, docks, swimming areas, shorelines or anchored boats unless operating at slow/no wake speeds.

Operate your watercraft in a counter-clockwise fashion for all water activities.

Observe all slow / no wake signs.

Do not operate your boat if you have been drinking.

Racing is prohibited.

Non-motorized craft (sailboats, rowboats, canoes, etc.) have the right-of-way over motorboats.

Any boat being overtaken has the right-of-way.

Personal Watercraft must obey the same rules as other boats.

A PWC shall not cross a wake closer than 150 feet from the boat making the wake.

No boat shall operate without proper lighting between sunset and sunrise.

Riding on the Bow is illegal if the vessel is not equipped with bow seating and is operating at greater than slow/no wake speed. It is illegal to ride on the gunwale.

Persons born after December 31, 1978, may not operate a PWC unless they have obtained a boating safety certificate.

The rider on a PWC is not to be sitting ahead of the driver (pg 23) of the boater safety booklet

Regulation No. 26 – GLADWIN COUNTY

Wc-26-95-002 *Lake Lancer*: HOURS FOR HIGH SPEED BOATING

On the water of Lake Lancer, all within sections 15, 16, 17, 20, 21 and 29, T.19N, T. 20N, R.1 W, Butman Township, Gladwin County, it is unlawful between the hours of 6:30 p.m. and 10 a.m. of the following day to:

- A. Operate a vessel at high speed
- B. Have a town or otherwise assist in the propulsion of a person on water skis, a water sled, kite, surfboard, or other similar contrivance.

The hours should be 7:30 p.m. to 11:00 a.m. of the following day when Eastern Daylight Savings Time is in effect. “High speed boating” is defined by the Marine Safety Act to mean a speed at or above which a motorboat reaches a planning condition.

Lake Lancer Boating Rules

Butman Township, Gladwin County, Michigan

Lake Lancer

An ordinance to regulate the speed of vessels and to provide for the safe use of the waters in Butman Township, Gladwin County: enacted under the authority of Act 303, Public Acts of 1967, as amended (M.S.A. 18.1287 (17)), being identical to State Administrative Rules filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.

THE TOWNSHIP OF BUTMAN ORDAINS:

SECTION I

All words and phrases used in this ordinance shall be construed and have the same meanings as those words and phrases defined in Act 303, P.A. 1967, as amended, M.S.A. 18.1287 (8).

SECTION II

Regulation No. 26, Gladwin County.

R 281.726.1. **Lake Lancer** slow—no wake speed zone.

Rule 1. On the waters of Lake Lancelot and the canals and channels connected thereto, section 16, 17, and 20; T20N, R1W, Butman Township, Gladwin County, it is unlawful for the operator of a vessel to exceed a slow—no wake speed when within 100 feet of any shore, dock, raft, buoyed or occupied bathing area, or vessel moored or at anchor, except when water skiers are being picked up or dropped off, if that operation is otherwise conducted with due regard to the safety of persons and property and in accordance with the laws of this state.

SECTION III

All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION IV

Violations of this ordinance are a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) together with costs of prosecution or imprisonment in the county jail or such other place of detention as the court may prescribe, for a period

Lake Lancelot Boating Rules

Ordinance No. 2A – Speed of Vessels and Safe Use of Waters

Butman Township, Gladwin County, Michigan

Lake Lancelot

An ordinance to regulate the speed of vessels and to provide for the safe use of the waters in Butman Township, Gladwin County: enacted under the authority of Act 303, Public Acts of 1967, as amended (M.S.A. 18.1287 (17)), being identical to State Administrative Rules filed in the Office of the Secretary of State.

THE TOWNSHIP OF BUTMAN ORDAINS:

SECTION I

All words and phrases used in this ordinance shall be construed and have the same meanings as those words and phrases defined in Act 303, P.A. 1967, as amended, M.S.A. 18.1287 (8).

SECTION II

Regulation No. 26, Gladwin County.

R 281.726.1. **Lake Lancelot:** slow—no wake speed zone.

Rule 1. On the waters of Lake Lancelot and the canals and channels connected thereto, section 16, 17, and 20; T20N, R1W, Butman Township, Gladwin County, it is unlawful for the operator of a vessel to exceed a slow—no wake speed when within 100 feet of any shore, dock, raft, buoyed or occupied bathing area, or vessel moored or at anchor, except when water skiers are being picked up or dropped off, if that operation is otherwise conducted with due regard to the safety of persons and property and in accordance with the laws of this state.

SECTION III

All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION IV

Violations of this ordinance are a misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) together with costs of prosecution or imprisonment in the county jail or such other place of detention as the court may prescribe, for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days, or said fine, costs of prosecution and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

Lake Lancelot Boating Rules

Regulation No. 26 – GLADWIN COUNTY

Wc-26-95-002 *Lake Lancelot*: HOURS FOR HIGH SPEED BOATING

On the water of lake Lancelot, all within sections 15, 16, 17, 20, 21 and 29, T.19N, T. 20N, R.1 W, Butman Township, Gladwin County, it is unlawful between the hours of 6:30 p.m. and 10 a.m. of the following day to:

A. Operate a vessel at high speed

B. Have a tow or otherwise assist in the propulsion of a person on water skis, a water sled, kite, surfboard, or other similar contrivance.

The hours should be 7:30 p.m. to 11:00 a.m. of the following day when Eastern Daylight Savings Time is in effect. “High speed boating” is defined by the Marine Safety Act to mean a speed at or above which a motorboat reaches a planning condition.

PWC Operation Rules *

*per 2017 Boating Michigan Course from MI DNR

Who may operate a Personal Watercraft (PWC)

- ◆ Those less than 14 years of age may NOT legally operate a PWC
- ◆ Those 14 and 15 years of age may operate a PWC legally Only if they have obtained a boating safety certificate and,....
 - He or she is accompanied on board by his or her parent or legal guardian or by a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal Guardian OR...
 - He or she is operating or riding the PWC at a distance of not more than 100 feet from his or her parent or legal guardian or from a person at least 21 years of age who has been designated by the parent or legal guardian.
- ◆ Those at least 16 years of age and born after December 31, 1978, may operate a PWC legally ONLY IF they have obtained a boating safety certificate.
- ◆ Those born on or before December 31st, 1978, may operate a PWC legally without restrictions.

Requirements Specific to Personal Watercrafts (PWCS)

In addition to adhering to all boating laws, personal watercraft (PWC) operators have requirements specific to their vessel

- ◆ Each person riding on or being towed behind a PWC must wear a U.S. Coast Guard-approved wearable Type I,II, or III PFD. Inflatable PFD's may not be used.
- ◆ You may not allow a child under 7 years of age to ride on or be towed behind a PWC unless with a parent, or legal guardian or a designee of the parent or legal Guardian.
- ◆ The lanyard of a PWC'S engine cut-of switch must be attached to the person, clothing or PFD of the operator.
- ◆ It is illegal to operate a PWC during the period that begins at sunset and ends at 8 :00 am (sunset) means that time determination by the national weather service.
- ◆ PWC'S must be operated in a reasonable and prudent manor at all times, for example, the following operations are illegal:
 - Jumping the wake of another vessel unnecessarily close to the other vessel
 - Weaving your PWC through congested traffic.

- Swerving at the last possible moment in order to avoid a Collision.
- ◆ A PWC must be operated at a “slow, no wake speed” if crossing within 150 feet behind another vessel unless the other is also a PWC.
- ◆ You may not operate a PWC within 200 feet of a Great Lakes shoreline unless traveling at a “slow, no wake speed” perpendicular to the shoreline.
- ◆ You may not operate a PWC in waters less than two feet deep unless you are operating at a “slow, no wake speed” or are docking or launching your PWC.
- ◆ It is illegal to harass wildlife or disturb aquatic vegetation with your PWC.

Other PWC Considerations

- ◆ Regulations concerning PWC’S can vary from state to state.
- ◆ A PWC is very maneuverable and responsive to slight turns of the steering control. At high speeds, a quick turn can make the PWC unstable, causing the operator and any passenger’s to fall off. This is why most state’s require that everyone aboard a PWC wear a PFD.
- ◆ Any passengers on a PWC should be able to hold a securely to the person in front of them or to the handholds, while keeping both feet firmly to the foot rests. Children who are too small to be able to do this should not ride.
- ◆ **A passenger on a PWC should never be seated in front of the operator**
- ◆ Keep hands, feet, loose clothing, and hair away from the pump intake area. Before cleaning debris from the pump intake, be sure to shut off the engine.
- ◆ The jet of water exiting the steering nozzle at the rear of the PWC can cause severe internal injuries. Anyone riding on a PWC should wear a wetsuit or other clothing that provides similar protection. Also, keep everyone clear of the steering nozzle unless the PWC is shut off.
- ◆ Frequently inspect your PWC electrical systems (e.g. starter and engine gauge connection) to ensure there is no potential for electrical spark. This is important because gas fumes could collect in the engine compartment and an explosion could occur if a spark from the electrical system ignited the fumes. After fueling sniff the engine compartment for any evidence of gas fumes.
- ◆ Never exceed the manufacturer’s recommended capacity for your PWC.
- ◆ Know your limits, and ride according to your abilities.

Who May Operate a Boat

- **Those less than 12 years of age**

May operate a boat powered by a motor of no more than 6 horsepower legally without restriction

May operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 6 horse power but no more than 35 horsepower legally **only if** they:

- Have been issued a boating safety certificate and have it on board the boat **and....**

- Are directly supervised on board by a person at least 16 years of age

May not operate a boat powered by a motor of more than 35 horsepower legally under any condition

- **Those born on or after July 1, 1996**, may operate a boat legally only if they have been issued a boating safety certificate and have it on board the boat.
- Those born before July 1, 1996 may operate a boat legally without restrictions

Who may attend the class?

Age requirement for the course is at least 6 months before your 12th Birthday to adults. A safety boater certificate is required for those born on or after July 1, 1996 to legally operate a boat in Michigan and must have it on board with them.

LAKE LANCER/LANCELOT 2018 TREATMENT PROGRAM

The property owners in this area are planning to have the waters chemically treated to control lake weeds and/or algae. This notice is being circulated in accordance with Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) procedures. Due to the uncertainty of weather, the treatment schedule is approximate. Please watch your shoreline for the posting of the 8.5 x 11 inch, yellow or green signs. The signs will indicate the date of the treatment, the products used, and any restrictions on the use of treated water for swimming, watering lawns, etc. One or more treatments involving water restrictive products may be applied. Please be aware that only products approved by the State of Michigan and the Federal government are being used. We have experienced ***no adverse effects on people, fish, wildlife or domestic pets since applying these products.*** We anticipate using one or more of the

2018 Tentative Treatment Schedule

Treatments will be occurring throughout the summer months, beginning in May through September. Please watch your shoreline for posting signs with specific restrictions. Please also note that you will see PLM on your lake many times this summer. We will not always be treating the lake, but performing many surveys, water quality testing, etc. Thank you for your understanding as we work to preserve and protect your lakes. The following TENTATIVE SCHEDULE is being provided so everyone is aware of the Plan of Action for Sugar Springs this season. Please be aware that many factors could adjust this schedule and it is only tentative. We do our best to stick with this schedule, but plant growth, weather, permits, etc all impact this schedule. The lakes have been tentatively scheduled for the following weeks of:

- Navigate /2,4-D:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Household use, irrigation, lawns and turf: 0 Days. Growing crops and non-crops “gardens”: Indefinite unless assay indicates 100 ppb or less. Potable water: Indefinite unless assay indicates less than 70 ppb. Fish consumption: No restrictions.
- Sculpin G/2,4-d amine:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Household use, irrigation, lawns and turf: 0 Days. Non-crops “gardens”: 2-14 Days depending on treatment conditions. Growing crops: assay of less than 100ppb. Livestock watering: See product label. Fish consumption: No restrictions.
- Renovate/Triclopyr/Navitrol:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Irrigation of Established lawns and turf: 0 Days. Household use & Irrigation excluding grasses: 120 days or once assay determines product to be non-detectable. Fish consumption: No restrictions.
- Renovate MaxG/Triclopyr & 2,4-d amine:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Household use, irrigation, lawns and turf: 0 Days. Non-crops “gardens”: 2-14 Days depending on treatment conditions. Growing crops: 120 days or until assay indicates 1ppb or less Triclopyr and 100ppb or less of 2,4-D. Livestock watering: See product label. Fish consumption: No restrictions.
- Diquat dibromide/Tribune:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Animal consumption of treated water: 1 day. Domestic water use and irrigation of turf & ornamentals: 3 days. Crop irrigation: 5 days.
- Stingray:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Animal consumption of treated water: 1 day. Domestic water use and irrigation of turf & ornamentals: 14days. Crop irrigation: 14 days.
- Hydrothol 191/Dimethylalkylamine salt of Endothall Aquathol K/Dipotassium salt of Endothall AquaStrike/Dipotassium salt of Endothall:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Household uses, irrigation, livestock watering: 2 weeks.
- Dipotassium salt of Endothall/ Diquat Dibromide/ AquaStrike/:** Swimming or bathing: 1 day. Animal consumption of treated water: 1 day. Domestic water use and irrigation of turf & ornamentals: 3 days. Household uses, irrigation, livestock watering: 2 weeks.

2018 Proposed Treatment Plan

Lake Lancer and Lancelot have very different plant communities and each lake is independently managed for those plants with a focused planned. Lake Lancelot has an infestation of Eurasian watermilfoil and Curlyleaf pondweed. Lake Lancelot has fewer native plant species present and a large focus of the program is improving the native plant community for the overall health of the lake and fishery. Lake Lancer has an infestation of Variable leaf milfoil as well as EWM and Curlyleaf pondweed. The native plant community in Lake Lancer is diverse and some species do cause a recreational concern mid season. Focus is being made on those species and prioritizing management to maintain diversity and reduce density when able. PLM will be aggressively managing each lake using the latest technologies to ensure the best possible management program is offered to your association. While we are working at controlling numerous plants and algae and that growth will vary seasonally with weather; we encourage all residents to assist in the management your lake frontage with promoting healthy lake front living practices (reducing fertilizers, green belts, removing

Starry Stonewort— Exotic Plant WATCHLIST



Starry stonewort has been quickly spreading throughout Michigan and is one of the primary focuses of management on Lake Lancelot and Lancer. Starry stonewort (*Nitellopsis obtusa*) looks like a rooted plant but it is actually an algae. The plant is native to Europe and Asia and was first discovered in the St. Lawrence River in 1978. In 1983, it was found in the Detroit River and has since infested many Michigan lakes. Starry stonewort resembles the native aquatic plant *Chara*. Unlike *Chara*, which is generally considered to be a beneficial plant, starry stonewort has a tendency to inhabit deeper portions of the lake and can form dense blankets several feet thick. These mats can severely impede navigation and limit growth of more beneficial plants. Starry stonewort anchors to the sediments through rhizoids (primitive root structures) which can also absorb nutrients. Like *Chara*, starry stonewort also absorbs nutrients from the water through its cell walls. Starry stonewort has tiny, star-shaped, tan colored reproductive structures called bulbils that are firm to the touch when compared to its soft branches. These reproductive bulbils have been shown to stay viable for several years in lake sediments. It is unclear what effects starry stonewort may have on a lake's fishery. However, the encroachment of starry stonewort into fish spawning beds may be a cause for concern. Both algacides and mechanical harvesting appear to be somewhat effective in controlling starry stonewort. However, given its propensity to produce massive amounts of growth, efforts to keep this invasive algae at bay will be difficult and potentially expensive. We are constantly on the lookout for new infestations of SSW for quick action. Please keep your eyes on the look out!

Riparian Responsibilities

Yes, if you live on a lake, YOU have responsibilities. Properly maintaining your lawn near the lake is an essential part to a healthy aquatic ecosystem. Some ways you can help your waterbody include:

- **Do not feed the ducks and geese. Remove dog, geese and duck droppings from lawns, docks, etc. Excess feces will increase nutrients within the lake. Please, do not sweep it into the lake!**
- **Create a natural buffer close to the water's edge and remove grass/turf touching the water's edge. A natural setting will filter excess nutrients from entering the water and help decrease erosion. The greenbelt should consist of native plant varieties of shrubs, flowers or trees that do not shed their foliage into the water. Natural buffers are also an excellent way to deter geese from making a stop on your beach front. Geese do not like areas where they cannot see the predators coming towards them.**
- **If you do fertilize make sure you are using Phosphorus free fertilizer. One pound of phosphorous may produce over 775 pounds of algae- "The slimy green stuff". If you must fertilize, apply nitrogen fertilizer when the grass is actively growing to minimize loss of nutrients to nearby waters. Avoid application of fertilizer prior to rainy days.**
- **RAKE YOUR BEACH! Remove aquatic plants, leaves/branches and other debris that washes up along the lakeshore so less decomposition occurs in or near the lake.**
- **Always use silt fences when building a new home or doing any yard-work that would cause erosion. Encourage the use of stone, brick and similar porous materials when building a landscape to minimize urban water collection.**
- **Keep all burn piles and debris piles away from lake. Do not burn near the water. The ash is concentrated nutrients!**

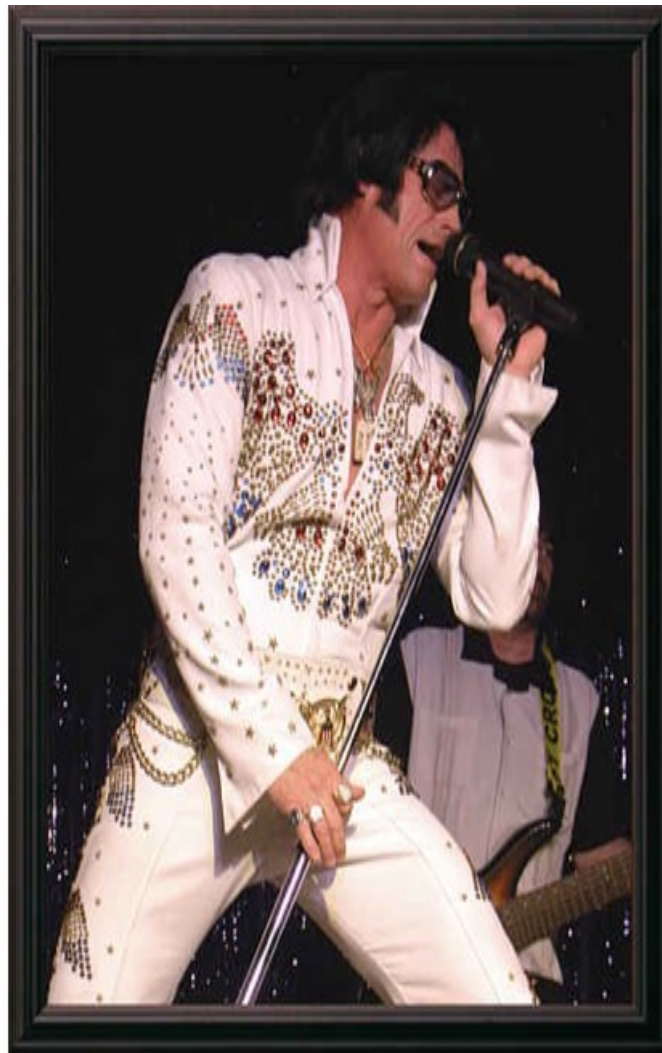

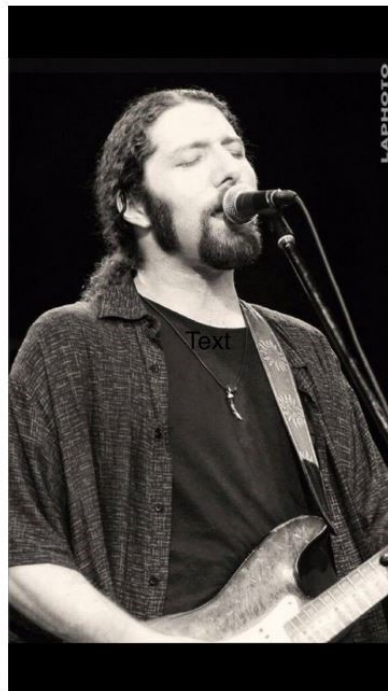

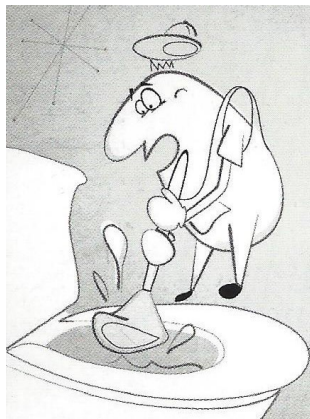
