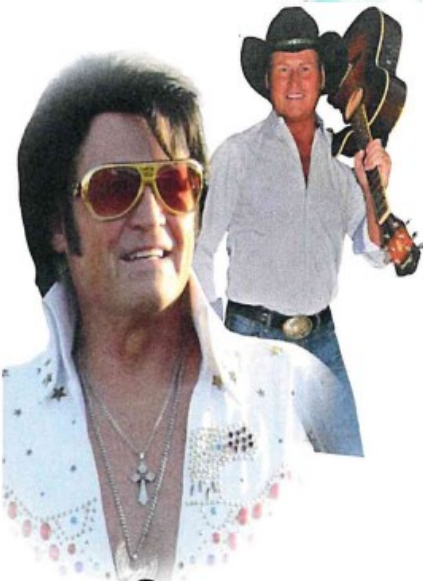

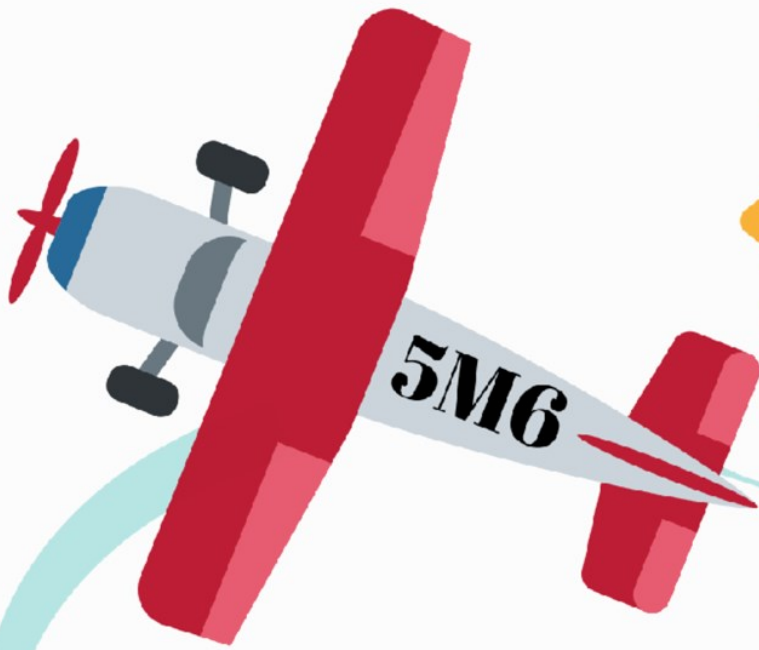

ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES
JUNE 17, 2023**

OFFICERS & DIRECTORS PRESENT: President, Tom Hug, Vice President, Craig Taunt; Directors: Dale Dunham, Eve Kaltz, James Issitt, Sherri Visnaw, and Jeff Weeman; SSPOA General Manager, David Harris, SSPOA Treasurer, Matt Schindler and Recording Secretary, Judith Sullivan. (Corporate Secretary and Director Laura Gentry – excused absence.)

OTHERS PRESENT: Thirty-nine (39) members, three (3) guests and speaker, Duane Reyhl representing Andrews, Hooper & Pavlik, PLC (Auditors)

At 1:00 p.m. the Sugar Springs Property Owners Association (SSPOA) Annual Membership Meeting was called to order by President Tom Hug at the SSPOA Activity Center. A video recording did not occur.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, President Hug opened the meeting with the Regular Order of Business pursuant to the Agenda.

ADDITIONS/CHANGES TO THE AGENDA: None

REVIEW AND APPROVE PREVIOUS ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES:

Minutes of SSPOA BOD Annual Meeting June 18, 2022 and SSPOA BOD Meeting, June 18, 2022 were approved at the September 15, 2022 meeting.

FINANCIAL REPORTS:

TREASURERS' REPORTS:

Treasurer, Matt Schindler, submitted a financial report to the Board prior to this meeting. He introduced Duane Reyhl, outside Auditor, and explained that Duane has worked with our former auditor, Steve Koehler and was familiar with Sugar Springs financials.

AUDITORS REPORT:

Mr. Reyhl made the following comments: "The advantage of having 'fresh personnel' is that when we have direct questions we can then approach the audit with a 'fresh start'. The bottom line with the audit is that Sugar Springs got the highest level that one can receive. That means that when we look at the financial statement our opinion is that the numbers and footnotes in the presentation are all fairly stated. Those numbers are constant in our opinion. As part of the audit, we like to meet separately with the Board of Directors to go through a more in depth analysis of the auditors financial statement and give them a chance to adapt and ask questions prior to this meeting. So this meeting will give you an overview of that discussion. One of the things that we look at in an audit is the overall management ... governance of the organization in terms of rules in place and checks and balances were reviewed with controls in place and governance structure and it's a good structure in place. We look at internal controls and in the ordinary course of an audit we ask lots of questions about checks and balances, controls that are in place to safeguard the assets and make sure the numbers are reported correctly – something we do every year.

Again it was a fresh look at that this year and did not have areas of concern. The financial results were good. This year overall was better than the prior year and some of the things we look at are your cash position. It was higher this year by about \$ 330,000 – as a result of good handling. The revenue – each line of revenue as far as the assessment, restaurant sales, the Pro Shop sales – those line items were higher in 2022 than in 2021. The expenses likewise were higher but not to the same degree as your debt revenue this year. \$350,000 income compared to last year. Last year was higher as well. This year was a little better. We expected that. Now that we are passed that, it seems like the Covid years were out of alignment but we're back

to normal. The Capital expenditures were properly recorded and appreciated. Cash flow operation was good. We looked at accounting policies and consistency. The way you have been measuring things from year to year has remained consistent. No really big surprises. I can go into a lot of details, but I know you have a summary that Steve has prepared as analysis over a period of years. With that high level of summary we welcome any questions you may have.”
(No questions were raised)

PRESIDENT’S REPORT:

President, Tom Hug stated the following: “Thank all who have been on the Board of Directors. I think that over the past several years we have made some pretty good decisions for the community. Communications, Constant contact reviewed questions from members, worked on golf course, restaurant, restored facilities – all decisions have affected each member in some way. The Board members work hard, attend lots of meetings, organize events and make decisions on which direction we should go in. Once again, thanks for trusting all of us. I must add ... and this goes to David and Tina ... that the success of the Hearth during the past year was great.”

ANNUAL STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS:

ARCHITECTURAL & ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: L. Gentry)

Chairman Scott Jones submitted a full report prior to this meeting. In summary the committee handled 156 actions (additions, lot modifications, outbuildings, tree maintenance, and other permits. Eighty-eight (88) violations were issued.

BUDGET COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: T. Hug)

The budget for 2023 was reviewed on November 7th, 2022 with committee members, a BOD representative and two members of the administrative staff. Without exception the 2023 budget was discussed and approved with the budget showing continuous improvements in both revenue and expense. Proposed capital improvement projects will not exceed 12% of revenue (\$405,000) for 2023. Noel Clark, Chair.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: (Bd Rep: D. Dunham)

The Buildings and Grounds Committee led by Committee Chair, Ron Francetic, has 15 loyal volunteers that are always ready and willing to help. Numerous projects were completed during the year including painting the exterior of several buildings including the Chalet.

ELECTION COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: J. Issitt)

Ballots for the BOD positions were mailed in May with a requested return no later than June 16, 2023. Votes to be counted and tally to be announced at this meeting. Connie Gullen, Chairman.

GOLF COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: S. Visnaw)

Chairman, Frank Bisogni, stated that two meetings were held during the 2022-2023 year and acts as a "Golf Advisory Committee". Copies of those minutes were submitted to the BOD prior to this meeting. Interaction with the new Club Pro, Dan McGinnis, has been good. Recommendations for improvements have been submitted.

LAKES COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: J. Weeman)

This fifteen (15) member committee is chaired by Mario Laudicina and meets the second Thursday of the month from April through October. Activities in 2022 through May of 2023 included working with the lake treatment company, PLM on necessary treatments and posting informational flyers on properties, the aeration system, water testing, goose egg collection, swim buoy installations, auditing signage on lakes, shoreline evaluations, hosted Lakes Committee booths at events, conducted a Boater Safety Class, sponsored a Clean Boats, Clean Waters event, groomed the Manchester boat docks buffer zone, received a stocking of approximately 45,000 Walleye fingerlings, donated a gift basket to the Airpark Fly-in, created and posted educational information to community members, identified commons shorelines for Buildings and Grounds to riprap and relocated the sediment basin at Kingsway Beach.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: J. Issitt)

The committee met in December and January to announce the 2023 Election for Sugar Springs Board of Directors positions. Applications were reviewed in February and six members appeared on the slate of candidates for the June election. Scott Jones chaired the committee.

PLANNING & MARKETING COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: J. T. Hug)

New Co-chairs, John Adams and Kim Ehrke led the committee with discussions on marketing the golf course and the campgrounds which included establishing a stronger relationship with the Gladwin County Chamber of Commerce.

RECREATION COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: E. Kaltz)

Kim Ehrke, Chairperson stated that all events held were extremely successful. These included the Arts and Crafts Show, a Cornhole Tournament, a road rally, Trunk or Treat sponsored by the Camping Committee, cookies with Santa, participating in the Gladwin Festival of Lights parade, a card party, an Easter Egg Hunt, the annual Ice Cream Social and a new themed game show event. With funds raised through these activities, the committee was able to donate two dining sets for the deck at the Hearth, a pool bench, large fireworks donation, donations to the Veterans and Butman Township Fire Department golf outings and a contribution to the maintenance of multiple flower gardens throughout Sugar Springs.

AD-HOC COMMITTEES

AIRPARK COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: C. Taunt)

Janine Foxx addressed the audience with the following information: A new windsock pole has been added; installed by members. Runway lights donated in a prior year are being researched for a possible installation. A new Airpark sign was ordered due to the former sign being stolen. Pancake breakfasts will continue with August 19, 2023 scheduled for this year. Two new members were added to the committee during the year.

CAMPING COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: C. Taunt)

Director Taunt commented his appreciation towards Dan Feinauer for chairing this committee. Camping Committee has raised funds and provided two kayak racks for the community to use. These are located on Queens Way.

MEMORIAL COMMITTEE: (Bd Rep: S. Visnaw)

Chairperson, Jo Hagey, shared committee projects in conjunction with the Men’s and Women’s Golf Committees which included maintenance on several gardens and made donations towards the garden at the Hearth entryway. Committee to continue working with families in honoring specific wishes.

Lakes Committee Mid-Summer Update

Our summer has been wonderful and many of us have been enjoying it spending time in and on the water; swimming, boating, and fishing here in Sugar Springs. We have managed to keep the weeds under control, water levels are staying on the high side, and our water testing shows excellent water quality in all parameters; Clarity, Chlorophyll, Dissolved Oxygen, Phosphorus and E.coli.

Here are a few reminders to ensure we maximize our enjoyment of our lakes:

Rake out floating vegetation from your shoreline. Unfortunately, many of us experience this after a busy boating weekend or after a lake treatment. Removing this debris will keep sediment and muck to a minimum, reduce algae, and improve the water quality. Sugar Springs Buildings and Grounds does a curbside pick-up of lake debris on Mondays and Fridays.

Personal buoys are not permitted. Items floating in the lake can be a navigation hazard. All other personal items (rafts, pads, etc.) should be brought to your shoreline or dock when not in use and secured so they will not blow away.

Operate all jet skis and personal watercraft safely. A driver's license doesn't always allow boat or PWC operation. Per Michigan law, everyone born after June 30, 1996, requires a Boater Education Card on their person to operate a motorized boat. PWC operators require a Boater Education Card if they were born after December 31, 1978.

Keep alert and sober when operating any vessel. All passengers must be seated within the railing of the boat. Life jackets must be worn by kids 7 and under. Maintain the proper distance from shoreline and other vessels when underway. Remember - You are responsible for your wake.

Don't feed any of the wildlife or fish. Mother Nature takes care of all her creatures. Feeding them leads to more droppings on the beaches and in the water which will lead to higher E.coli levels in our lakes.

Our Pike population is still very high. If you're out there fishing, don't catch and release your pike. Pike is a very predatory species and negatively impacts the population of other fish in our lakes. Keep your catch according to DNR guidelines. If you don't prefer to eat pike, you can donate your catch for the feeding of rescued animals to The Ark, 3878 South Maple Valley Rd, St. Helen, Michigan 48656; info@arkridders.org; Tel 989-389-3305

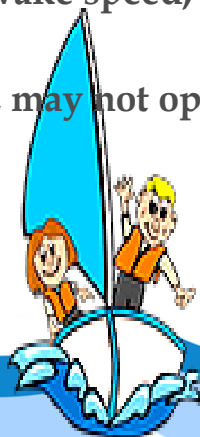


Boating on Lake Lancelot and Lake Lancer

Operating Regulations & Rules of the Road

Safety is the primary consideration to having a safe and enjoyable outing. The excitement, fun and the thrills come in at a distant second. Enjoy our lakes!

1. Township ordinance prescribes slow/no wake speeds between the hours of 7:30 pm to 11:00 am daily.
2. A person shall not operate a Personal Watercraft (PWC) during the period that begins one (1) hour before sunset and ends at 8:00 am.
3. No skiing, tubing, or towing without an observer.
4. Do not operate your boat or PWC within 100 feet of stationary objects, docks, swimming areas, shorelines or anchored boats unless operating of slow/no wake speeds.
5. Operate your watercraft in a counterclockwise fashion for all water activities.
6. Observe all slow/no wake signs.
7. Do not operate your boat if you have been drinking.
8. Racing is prohibited.
9. Non-motorized craft (sailboats, rowboats, canoes, etc.) have the right-of-way over motorboats.
10. Any boat being overtaken has the right-of-way.
11. Personal Watercraft must obey the same rules as other boats.
12. A PWC shall not cross a wake closer than 150 feet from the boat making the wake.
13. No boat shall operate without proper lighting between sunset and sunrise.
14. Riding on the bow is illegal if the vessel is not equipped with bow seating and is operating of greater than slow/no wake speed, it is illegal to ride on the gunwale.
15. Persons born after December 31, 1978, may not operate a PWC, unless they have obtained a boating safety certificate.

NOTICE Sugar Springs Lake 2023 Treatment Program

The property owners in this area are planning to have the waters chemically treated to control lake weeds and/or algae. 2023 Proposed Treatment Plan

Lake Lancer and Lancelot have very different plant communities and each lake is independently managed for those plants with a focused plan. Lake Lancelot has an infestation of Eurasian watermilfoil and Curlyleaf pondweed. Lake Lancelot has fewer native plant species present and a large focus of the program is improving the native plant community for the overall health of the lake and fishery. Lake Lancer has an infestation of Variable leaf milfoil as well as EWM, Starry Stonewort and Curlyleaf pondweed. The native plant community in Lake Lancer is diverse and some species do cause a recreational concern mid season. Focus is being made on those species and prioritizing management to maintain diversity and reduce density when able. PLM will be aggressively managing each lake using the latest technologies to ensure the best possible management program is offered to your association. While we are working at controlling numerous plants and algae, growth will vary seasonally with weather; we encourage all residents to assist in the management your lake frontage with promoting healthy lake front living practices (reducing fertilizers, green belts, removing debris, raking your beach, etc). Let's all work together to continue to improve your beautiful lakes!

A Lake Resident's KEY TO SURVIVAL

PLM Lake & Land Management Corp. appreciates the opportunity to a part of your lake management program. Your lake is a diverse ecosystem which requires the use of multiple management tools. In addition to the services we provide, we still need your help! You can directly improve your lake frontage by taking a few small steps that can have widespread impacts on the entire lake. Everyone's actions play a role in the health of your lake and as you own property on the lake, you have a large investment in the overall health of the lake. Therefore, everyone needs to take action for the overall health of the lake. It is not just the land touching the lake that impacts the health of the lake, but all the land in the area that makes up the watershed. Everyone's actions on and off the lake plays a role in the condition of the lake. Do your part and help get your neighbors involved in caring for the lake. The following suggestions are just a few actions that can be taken to help create a healthy lake and beach frontage.

Do not feed the ducks and geese. Remove dog, geese and duck droppings from lawns, docks, etc. Excess feces will increase nutrients within the lake. Please, do not sweep it into the lake!

Create a natural buffer close to the water's edge and remove grass/turf touching the water's edge. A natural setting will filter excess nutrients from entering the water and help decrease erosion. The greenbelt should consist of native plant varieties of shrubs, flowers or trees that do not shed their foliage into the water. Natural buffers are also an excellent way to deter geese from making a stop on your beach front. Geese do not like areas where they cannot see the predators coming towards them.

If you do fertilize make sure you are using Phosphorus free fertilizer. Talk with your neighbors and develop a Phosphorus Free program which uses no phosphates and slow release nitrogen. One pound of phosphorous may produce over 775 pounds of algae- "The slimy green stuff". If you must fertilize, apply nitrogen fertilizer when the grass is actively growing to minimize loss of nutrients to nearby waters. Begin fertilizing in the spring when temperatures are warm and discontinue before the grass ceases to grow in the fall. Avoid application of fertilizer prior to rainy days.

Perforate lawn periodically and seed and mulch exposed soil (to prevent erosion).

Remove aquatic plants, leaves/branches and other debris that washes up along the lakeshore so less decomposition occurs in or near the lake.

Always use silt fences when building a new home or doing any yard-work that would cause erosion.

Keep all burn piles and debris piles away from lake. Do not burn near the water. The ash is concentrated nutrients!

Encourage the use of stone, brick and similar porous materials when building a landscape to minimize urban water collection.

HAB's What You Need to Know

During the summer months, many Michigan lakes experience noxious blue green algae blooms. Cyanobacteria (cy-a-no-bac-te-ri-a), also known as blue-green algae, are a natural part of lakes, rivers, and ponds. Unfortunately, some species can produce toxins, called cyanotoxins that can make humans and animals sick. When conditions are right, these organisms can rapidly increase to form Harmful Algae Blooms, or HABs. These blooms can last a few days, weeks or longer and are considered harmful because they may contain toxins. A bloom can start small and become very large in size and can give off a foul odor.

What You Need to Know:

- Not all algal blooms contain toxins, but it is difficult to tell by looking at a bloom if it is harmful.
- HABs can be a variety of colors such as blue, green, blue-green, brown, white, purple, or red.
- A bloom can occur when the water temperature is warm, conditions are calm, and the water has a high level of nutrients, like phosphorus and nitrogen.
- Blooms typically occur in Michigan from summer to fall. A bloom can last days to a few months. Blooms may disappear but then form again within the same season.
- Typically, symptoms of illness from cyanotoxins appear within hours to days in humans. If symptoms do appear, the severity will depend on how long the exposure was, the type of cyanotoxin, and how the person was exposed.
- While there have been no confirmed deaths of dogs in Michigan due to exposure to algal blooms, there have been a few dog deaths where exposure to algal blooms may have been a contributing factor, but no definitive cause could be determined.
- If a HAB is suspected, do not swim, wade, or touch the water where algae are present. Humans and pets should be rinsed thoroughly in fresh water if there has been any contact with the water. Humans and pets should avoid the water entirely if there is a large algal bloom spread out across the lake, river, or pond, including water sports like boating.

Homeowners, you may not store your campers at your home. If you need to perform maintenance or cleaning, please do so expeditiously. If you need more than one maintenance period per year, please contact the A & E Committee

Campers, you may not leave anything on your lots at the end of the season, except; utilities, one swing set, one picnic table, ground level deck with one step and no railing, one boat dock, and a boat hoist. Everything else must be removed by November 30.

No signs, except "For Sale" signs, property identity signs (ie. *Smith Cabin*) and contractor signs, only when work is in progress, are allowed. Camping lots for sale must use special signs available from the POA office only. Signs that are in violation will be removed.

Please be mindful of the lake rules and have a great summer!

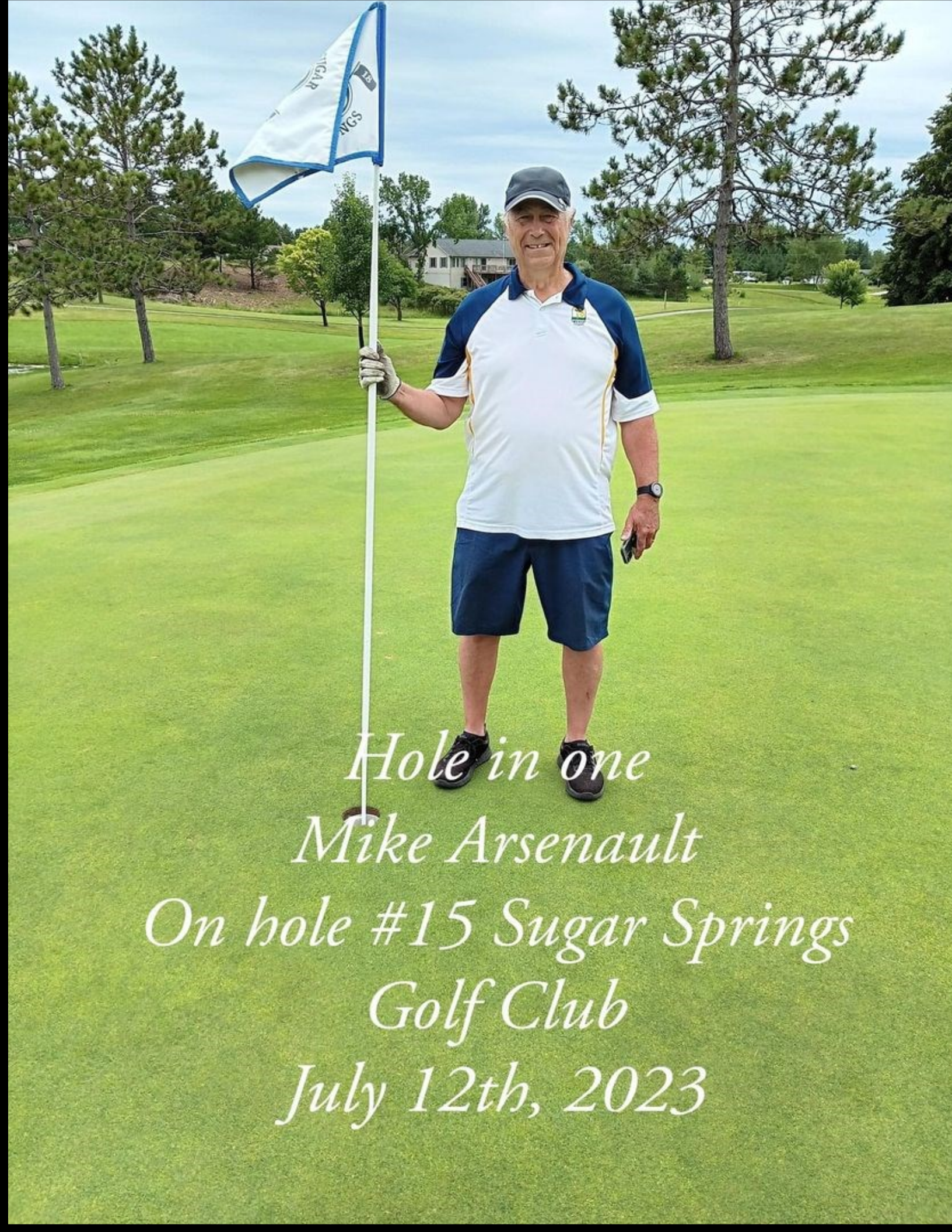

Hello Sugar Springs members!!

I hope everyone has been able to get out and enjoy the course during the month of July and had a safe and happy holiday over the 4th.

We were fortunate to get much more rain this month compared to June, which has helped to alleviate much of our dry areas on the course. That, along with our irrigation pump being repaired will help to maintain our green course throughout the season barring any other irrigation related malfunctions.

This month we hosted multiple scrambles including our member-member/member guest tournaments and even a new Fun Flag tournament that looked to be a fun new format. On July 31st and August 1st we will be having our handicap championship as well.

Today (July 24th), we began prepping for the event by vertical cutting and topdressing our greens. This process helps to keep our greens rolling smooth and true. Verticutting greens lessors the thatch layer on the green, allowing for better moisture transfer form the surface to the root zone. The sand topdressing added after helps to maintain a firm putting surface as well still allowing the water to move through the sand layer. This process also helps to heal up any ball marks or scarred areas on the greens. This is one of many maintenance practices done to our greens that helps keep them rolling at a good speed, so we try to do this process every 4-6 weeks, if weather and scheduling allows.

As the season has progressed I have noticed members making more of an effort to find and repair their ball marks on the greens. We have also noticed the use of the sand containers on the carts to fix your divots in the fairways. Myself and the rest of the Golf Course maintenance staff appreciate the help from you in helping to keep our course as nice as we can. Thank you, and I hope you all continue to play and enjoy our wonderful golf course at Sugar Springs.

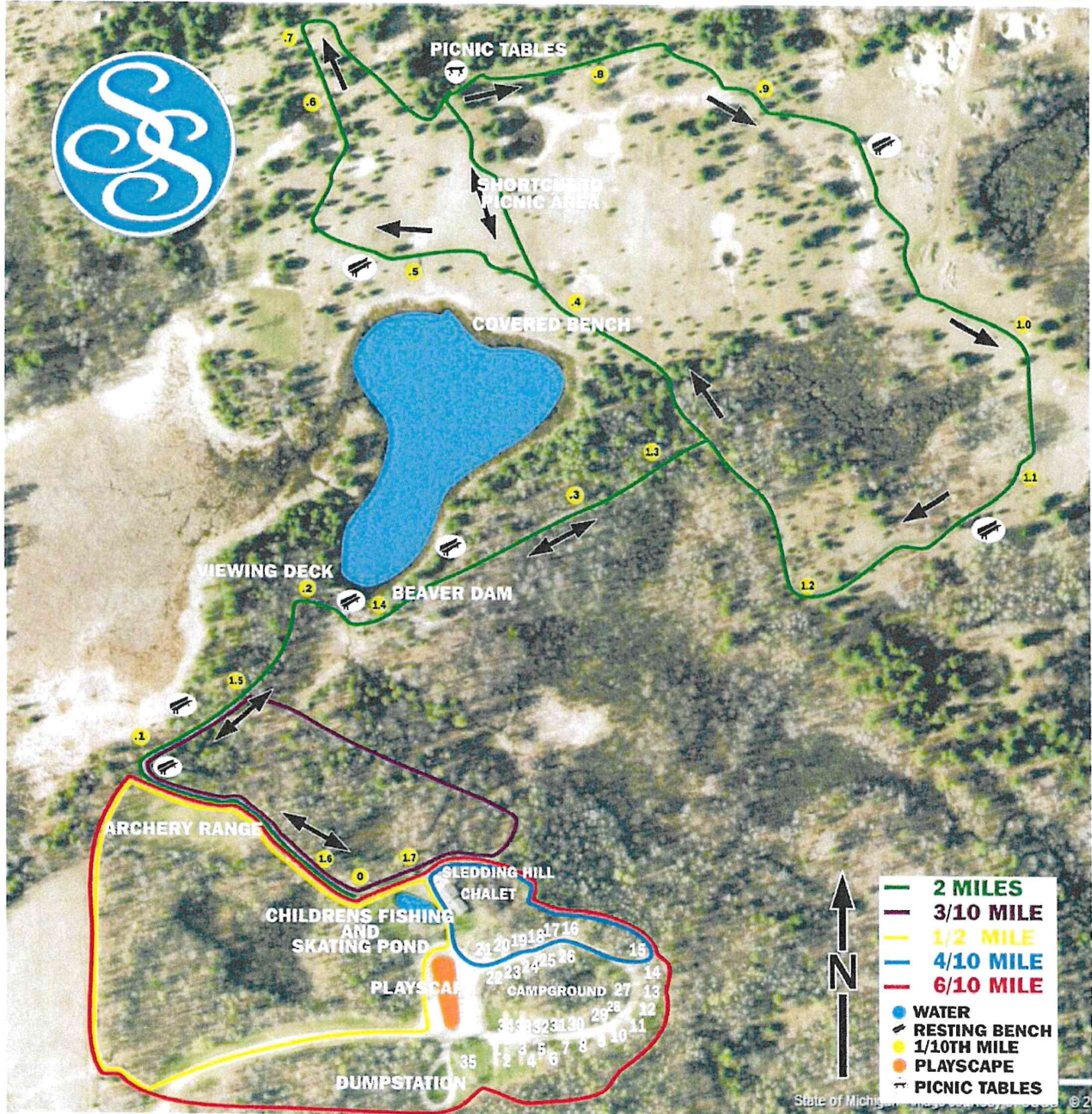

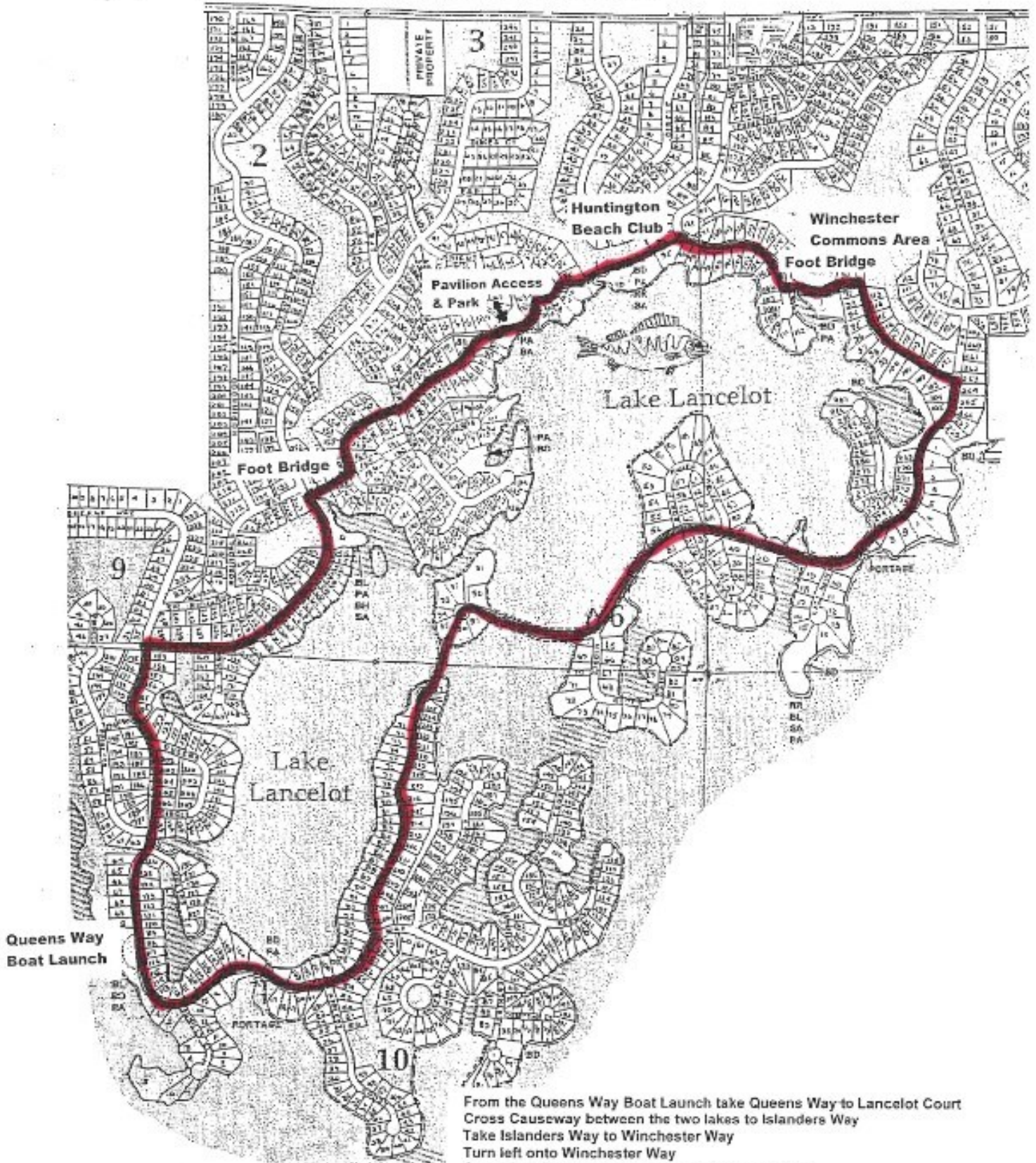

Walking Trail Map around Lake Lancelot

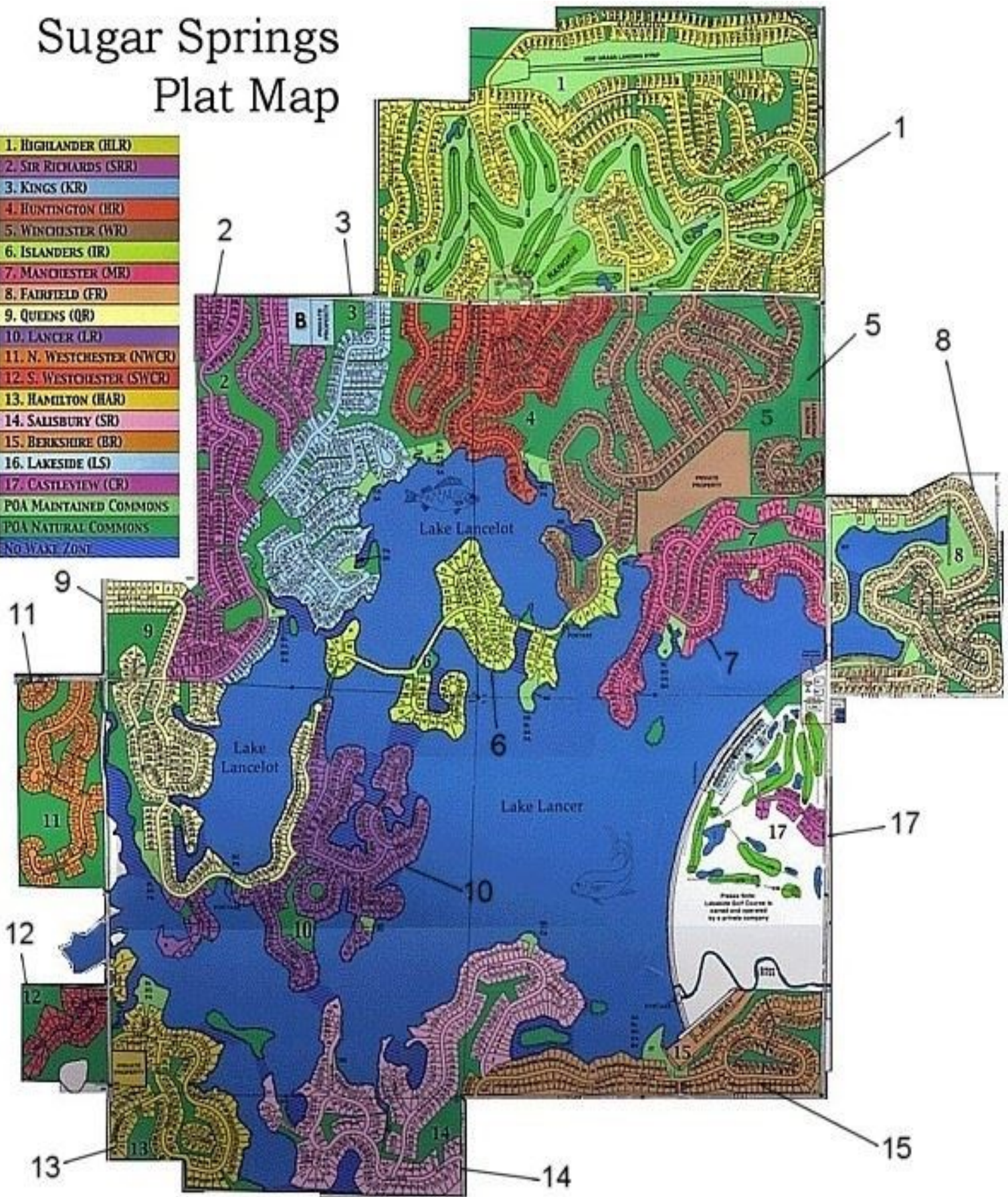

1. Ultra-Thin Worchester Way from Winchester Way to Sugar River Road
2. Ultra-Thin Linksvie Way from Rough Court to Sugar River Road
3. Ultra-Thin Winchester Way from Islanders Way to Islanders Way
4. Ultra-Thin Butman Road from Hamilton Way to Grass Lake Road
5. Crack and Chip Seal Dutcher and Shell Roads from Hockaday Road
6. Regravel 2 miles of gravel road. Locations TBD
7. Crack Seal Local System. Locations TBD
8. 2 Brining Applications to Gravel Roads

The total cost for these projects is approximately \$190,000.

With the help of the Gladwin County Road Commission, we will try to keep you informed as to when these projects will begin.

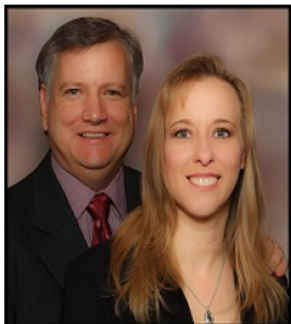
